In a fitting climax to the Australian National Championships (ANC) in Perth, the host state surprised the warm favourites, NSW, to easily take out the premier event, the Open Teams. WA won each of the six 10-board segments to win by 89 IMP's

An excellent venue, the Rendezvous Hotel built by Alan Bond, together with superb organisation and strong support from local bridge players combined to make this ANC one of the best ever. It also halted a disturbing trend in recent years to locate the event in other than a quality hotel.

Justice can also said to have been done on this deal from the qualifying stage when Martin Doran engineered a huge gain for Victoria in the Open making a grand slam that went down at the other table.

Having given a negative response to the game force opening Henry Sawicki's raise to the three level was more encouraging than bidding game immediately. This encouraged Doran to head slamwards. Correctly interpreting 5H as looking for help in that suit Sawicki jumped to slam. Hoping to find four trumps and the KH in dummy Doran optimistically converted to the 'grand'. West avoided the temptation of trying to cash the (DIAMOND) A in favour of trump, the only lead to threaten the contract. With only two ruffs available, declarer had to decide whether to take the heart finesse or cash the ace and play for the Kxx with either player. The 4-3 break, itself only an approximate 40% chance, was a pre-requisite, and the king being with the four card holding was around twice as likely.

Doran knew his odds and rising with the (SPADE) J he played a heart to the Queen. When this held he was over the first hurdle. He trumped a heart in dummy, returned to hand with a diamond ruff to trump another heart. When both opponents followed suit he was home. A club to hand allowed him to draw trumps and claim with the rest, the heart loser going away on a club. At my table where Bobby Richman also led a trump declarer took the anti-percentage line of playing hearts from the top, eventually losing a trick to the King. This massive swing was not enough to get Victoria into the final and we had to settle for third place as did our Women's teams.

There was better news from our Seniors (over 55) and Juniors (under 25). Both squads were successful. Victor Muntz/Stam Klofa, Gary Ridgway/David Happell, David White/John Pettitt accounted for South Australia in the Seniors by winning 182 to 137. Tim Lee/Ben Barned, Leigh Gold/Hakan Lynsgo, Kenneth Wan/Kevin Chan with Cathy Mill as non-playing captain beat New South Wales 119 to 87.
