PLASTIC EVALUATION

This method of hand evaluation will give you a realistic and accurate guide to the changing value of your hand as the bidding progresses. This formula works best on hands where partner bids two suits.

To the original point value of your hand, add a point to every jack, queen or king in the suits partner bids. Take off a point from every jack, queen or king in the suits partner does not bid.

The readjusted point value of your hand will be a remarkably accurate guide to its true worth.

For example, you hold: 10 8

A Q 7 5 3
Q J 8 3
9 2

and in the first auction the bidding proceeds:

Partner	You
1♦	1♥
1♠	INT

Your hand has become effectively a six point hand. Tread carefully.

In the second auction the bidding proceeds:

Partner	You
1♦	1♥
2♥	3♥

Your hand has become effectively a twelve point hand - a sound game invitation.

While this method is not infallible - some partners always seem to bid bad suits - you will find you are bidding more when it is right to, and staying low when it is right to, on hands of superficially the same point count.

For diamonds your hand is worth 15 points 6D is a strong possibility.

- (1) Artificial game-force
- (2) Relay rebids showing South's shape
- (3) Setting diamonds as trumps
- (4) Minimum opening, 11-13 points

South has shown 7 diamonds and some 7-3-2-1 pattern, residues unknown.

West leads the 3♠, attitude lead, low encouraging. The J♦ is played from dummy. How do you plan the defence? Decide before looking at the full deal, Board 11 from Stage 1, Round 11:

At the table I won trick 1 with the Q♦ and returned the 9♠ ducked to dummy's 10♠. Leigh Gold continued with the A♦, five – two – seven, followed by the ♦3: six . . .

He thought for quite some time about what to play from hand. When he spotted another chance if the Q♦ did not drop, he rose with the K♦. Bad news!

He continued with four rounds of hearts, which led to this ending:

♠ 7 4	♦ 2
♥ --	♦ --
♦ --	♦ Q
♣ A 9 5	♣ J 10 7
♠ A K 8	♠ --
♥ --	♦ J 10
♦ --	♣ Q 8 2

Gold exited with a spade from dummy. West could take three spade tricks, but declarer collected two club tricks at the end to make his contract and +400.

Did you find the right move at trick 1? East needs to duck the J♦. Now if declarer misguesses the diamonds, the defence have enough communication to defeat 3NT.

Of course, declarer might guess diamonds, but if you can do that, you might as well be in 6D (and 5D is a safer conveyance than 3NT).

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MARK HORTON'S BOOK - PART 4

“Declarer Play”

To become a good player you have to acquire the ability to think about all fifty-two cards, not merely the ones you can see in your own hand. Whilst it is possible to become quite a good player without bothering if you want to make real progress then you simply have to do it.

I know many players who can perform precise mathematical calculations about the merit of various lines of play. Others have learnt all the standard card combinations by heart and can be relied upon to never miss a safety play. However, in my experience

these skills count for only a very little on the Road to Bridge Mastery.

Elimination

One of declarer's strongest weapons is the use of elimination play, especially when there is a trump suit. (I am tempted to say it is declarer's strongest weapon, as it plays a part on so many deals.) The basic idea is to end up forcing a defender to choose between opening up an important suit or conceding a ruff and discard. In terms of practical advice I would say this: If you have the opportunity to eliminate a suit from both your hand and that of dummy it will invariably be right to do so, even if you cannot see an immediate advantage in doing so. Here is a simple example:

Dealer: West

North/South Vul:

♠ J 9 8 4 2
♥ K 7 5
♦ A J 10
♣ A 2

♠ A K Q 10 7
♥ A Q 2
♦ K 9 4
♣ 8 6

West led the king of clubs and declarer immediately realised that the success of the contract depended on not losing a diamond trick. Declarer won the opening lead in dummy, drew trumps and eliminated the heart suit, West producing one trump and three hearts. Crediting West with seven clubs for the opening bid it appeared that West had started with one spade, at least three hearts and seven clubs, thereby making East a heavy favourite to have the all important queen of diamonds. Accordingly declarer took the diamond finesse through East.

In the replay, needless to say, the master adopted a different approach. After winning the opening lead he drew trumps, cashed three winning hearts and exited with a club. It does not matter which defender wins. If they play a heart or club declarer can ruff in one hand and discard a losing diamond from the other. If either defender plays a diamond they will have located the missing queen for you.

When I use this hand in the classroom I give both East and West a queen of diamonds to ensure that

any player who finesses goes down! Even with two diamond queens in the pack the contract cannot be defeated if you follow the elimination as you can finesse against both of them!"
