

# Post mortems with total hindsight

Judging from the hand records, Sunday's hands seemed relatively devoid of spectacular double game swings or games that were there to be made but hard to find. The secret of doing well seemed to be more in accurate defence in not letting through the games that were not there and in avoiding overbidding. Judged by what happened as opposed to the intrinsic interest of the hands, a few stood out

### Session 9: Board 24—Deep Finesse beats (most of) the field



Deep Finesse suggests that real bridge players could make

 $3 \blacklozenge$ ,  $2 \blacktriangledown$ , or  $2 \spadesuit$  E-W or  $3 \clubsuit$  N-S.

Well some of the field made 3 •, particularly if they were playing in four, but the majority managed eight tricks only. Similarly, making eight tricks was more common than making nine in clubs.

Three pairs found two hearts—one went two off doubled, one went one off undoubled—but one made eleven tricks (another pair made eleven tricks in diamonds). Eat your heart out those of you thought you were good declarers. Not a single pair found the spade moysean attractive.

### Session 10: Board 8- You must have something partner

I may not be the only one who feels destined to be declarer where I get West's hand. There may be a rational explanation for the number of people bidding to  $3 \, \text{\AA}$  and  $4 \, \text{\AA}$  - but it seems unlikely that partner supported the suit. With only a few exceptions, the score on this board was about how much E-W went off. Almost the whole field played in spades and only three got a positive result. Deep Finesse said you could make  $1 \, \text{\AA}$  but this was too hard for many. The only people who did worse than the  $4 \, \text{\AA}$  bidders were the ones who got to  $4 \, \text{\blacktriangledown}$  and  $5 \, \text{\blacktriangledown}$ .

Some got to 3NT and a couple made. Only Klinger / Nagy stopped in and made 2NT.

### Session 10: Board 6: Where was the testosterone?

Not competing within reason was bad on this hand (I'm not including the eleven pairs who found themselves deep in phantom territory at the five level in diamonds or spades).

The interesting difference here was between the Women's and the Open contracts. The Open was awash with woosy two and three level contracts.

In the Women's if you wanted to play the hand in spades you had to be in four and going down (although one pair made 11 tricks)


For Board 27 in Match 6 of Stage One, Bobby Richman (East) was declarer in 4.

dummy. He then tried running the clubs but Chris ruffed the Q with the G he didn't have, defeating the otherwise cold Q game.
