After using Roman Key-card Blackwood, which included a five diamond enquiry which revealed that North held the queen of spades but not the king of diamonds, you opted for the best matchpoint spot of six notrump.

West leads the queen of clubs, which you take with the ace. As you have twelve tricks no matter who holds the king of diamonds, what is your plan to make a golden overtrick?



### Tim Bourke's Problem – Solution

An overtrick is only possible if East began with the king of diamonds. If diamonds are 3-2 with the king onside then using the queen and ten of spades as entries for finesses will produce thirteen tricks. The problems come when East began with four or five diamonds to the king, which will THEN require YOU TO GENERATE three entries to dummy for finesses in diamonds. Suppose the full deal is:




The best play at trick two is to lead the jack of spades and, once West follows, overtake it with the queen. When the cards lie as in the diagram, you can finesse the queen of diamonds, return to dummy with a spade to the eight and finesse the jack of diamonds. A spade to the ten will allow a third diamond finesse and give you your precious overtrick.

If both defenders follow to the first spade, you will fall back on the nine of spades falling singleton or doubleton, to give you the needed entry to dummy for the extra diamond finesse in case East turns up with four or five diamonds headed by the king. Otherwise, you will have to be content with only making twelve tricks.

### **Seniors' Last Train Match 8**


This round saw Bobby Richman / David Adams pitted against John Brockwell / Adrian Thompson

Brockwell / Thompson got off to an excellent start on the first board played.



John was economical in the bidding – he opened 2♣ and, when Adrian responded 2NT, he shot straight to 6♣. The play of the hand did not extend John after he received a diamond lead and played the 10 at trick one.

A few boards later and it was Bobby's turn to score through the auction.




John opened 1♥ as dealer and Adrian replied with 1NT. Bobby put in 2♠!


This ran round to Adrian who backed in with 3♦ and John corrected to 3♥. David led the ♠4 to Bobby's Queen and he cashed one more high

spade before switching to a low trump. John played a second trump to Bobby's Ace and the King of spades was cashed for the defensive book. David ruffed the last spade for one off and there was still a defensive club trick to come.

Then a fortunate lie of the heart suit saw Bobby bring home a thin no trump game.




Bobby opened 1NT and David raised to game. John led the ♥10 which Bobby took in hand with the King. He played a spade to dummy's Jack and a club back to hand. The ♦10 saw John play small so Bobby played dummy's Ace. He now cashed his clubs and then switched back to spades. When John took the Ace, the position was



and there was no way to disentangle the heart tricks. John actually played the Ace and suddenly Bobby had eleven tricks.


But then Bobby missed a chance for a trump promotion and a game slipped through.



After John opened 1♦, Adrian propelled himself to 4♥. Bobby led his singleton diamond, taken by table's Ace. Adrian quickly cashed three rounds of spades to divest himself of his diamond loser.

He came off table with an unsuccessful finesse of the Queen of clubs. Bobby continued the suit to the Ace in the closed hand. Adrian now led a trump towards the Queen 10.

If Bobby flies with the Ace then he can give David a club ruff and the diamond return will see the Jack of hearts converted into the fourth defensive trick.
