## Tim Bourke's Problem – Solution

As you (HAVE) eleven certain tricks, your plan for developing a twelfth should be based on West holding the king of clubs. Suppose the full deal is something like this:

♠ J 10 5 3 2	
♥ A K 7 6

One of the equivalent approaches\* on this layout is to cash the ♠K-Q, cross to dummy with a heart to the king, which will remove West's last major suit card, and to then lead the ten of diamonds. If West takes his king of diamonds he will be endplayed, with only minor suit cards left. If he leads a diamond next, you will make five spades, four diamond, two hearts and a club while on a club exit you will make five spades, two hearts, three diamonds and two clubs.

If West ducks the ten of diamonds, you will play a diamond to the jack. Again if West takes it, he must give you your twelfth trick in whichever minor suit he returns and if he ducks you will play the eight of diamonds next, to finally endplay West for a minor suit return.

I hope your not plan did not include cashing both the jack and ten of spades before leading the ten of diamonds! (You can spare a low club on the jack of spades but you would soon discover that there is no winning discard from your hand if you decide to cash the ten of spades too.)

\* Alternatively, on the given deal, you could just lead the five of diamonds provided you kept at least one spade winner in hand. However, the suggested plan also works when West has opened two no trumps without the king of diamonds.

Board 1 saw George and Terry put to the question on the opening lead. George was successful, Terry wasn't but was this reasonable? You judge.

Paul opened 1NT and David put in 2♠ to show 5-5 in spades and a minor. Terry bid the heart game. Ron led a small spade and it was decision time – as East has five spades to West's three – probability suggests that you should fly the Ace. Terry did and the four-nil trump break saw him one off.

After a similar auction, George ran the spade lead to his Queen and was now able to avoid a club loser.

Board 5 saw Lady Luck smile rather more kindly on Terry

Paul Wyer opened 1♣ as dealer and Terry responded the obvious 1♥. Paul repeated his clubs and Terry introduced diamonds. This gave Paul something of a problem which he attempted to solve by bidding 2♠. He was, no doubt, delighted to hear Terry subsequently describe this as “a three card suit with some good stuff in it” – about as accurate a description as a politician’s justifications.

Heartened by this cover of his spade inadequacy, Terry bid the nine trick game. He was slightly taken aback by the sight of dummy but, with the ♦Q onside, Paul’s ♠J proved to be just enough “good stuff”.

Board 8 saw David Hoffman forced into an awkward guess by a pre-empt from Paul. The dealing machine and the defence punished him severely for getting it wrong.

Terry led the Ace of spades and was affronted by the sight of the ♥Q being placed in dummy. He switched to his diamond and ruffed the diamond return. The ♠K came next for Paul to discard a club. Somewhat optimistically, Terry continued a further spade which Paul ruffed flamboyantly – with a small diamond. Terry then put David out of his misery with a defensive claim for two more trump tricks – just -500 for getting the decision wrong over the 4♦ bid.

This table had started with Board 11 and Terry and Paul might have done well to heed a tip which I once heard Seamus Browne offer a New Zealand woman international – “Always play the first board of the day in a part score.”

Terry and Paul didn't and Ron made them pay with a killing lead.

Then David picked up a very nice looking hand only to find himself being pushed around by Paul, yet again.

David opened 2♣ as East and Terry stuck in 2♦. Ron passed and Paul raised the ante to 3♦. David bid the heart game but Paul still wasn't finished and pushed again with 5♣. As can be seen, this only goes one off but David was after bigger fish and bid 5♥.

A club lead to Paul's Ace saw a diamond return. Terry took his Queen and Ace and then gave Paul a ruff in the suit for a snappy two off.

## Strip For Action

Jimmy Wallis was doubly pleased by this one from the Last Train when the opponents pushed him uncomfortably high. Doubly pleased because he avoided the killing lead and then because he found a strip squeeze to bring home his contract.

It looks like a club lead would kill this but, naturally enough, Chris led his ♦A. He switched to a spade which Jimmy took on table to facilitate a successful finesse of the ♥J. He now set to work on the trumps – cashing the remaining five. This left

South opened 1♠ and West put in 2♦. North made a negative double and South repeated his spades. North tried with a 3♦ enquiry and South was happy to oblige with 3NT.

West led the ♥10! South gave this a great deal of thought before finally finessing. East returned the suit and West was given a clue to the distribution of hearts when South discarded a spade. Unhesitatingly, he unblocked the ♥2(!) and East's long heart was on the way to the recycle bin.

Declarer took the heart on table and ran the Jack of clubs to West's King. A third round of hearts was played. Declarer played another club which was ducked by East and West discarded a diamond (passing up the chance to get the blocking heart out of the way – though in all fairness, at this stage he didn't know about partner's ♣A.) he still didn't know about this when declarer continued another club and so he discarded another diamond. Finally, East took his Ace of clubs and played the ♥5 to West's 7; kissing goodbye to the trick taking potential of his ♥6 as he did so.

In the normal course of events, I am only too happy to name names when an expert makes

a mistake of this type but Kim Morrison is a really nice guy and so wild horses won't drag his name from me.
