## Tim Bourke's Problem – Solution

### SOLUTION

You can always make ten tricks provided the diamonds are 3-2 and neither defender can get a club ruff. These assumptions point the way to the best plan to make ten tricks. The first move must be to ruff the ten of hearts. Next play a club to the king. Suppose the full deal is:

East will take the king of clubs with the ace and, hoping to shorten your trumps inconveniently, will play a third heart. After ruffing this with the eight of trumps, cash your three minor suit winners and then play a third round of diamonds.

As you will have already made six tricks, when West wins his queen of diamonds he has no winning defence. His best shot is to play a trump, You play dummy's five of trumps and win the trick with the jack. You make the next three tricks on a cross ruff.

If East returns a trump after winning the ace of clubs, play ace-king and another diamond. Either you will be able to follow the above approach or, on a non-heart return, you can draw trumps and claim.

## Four Hands

The crucial match of the morning in the NOT was that between the two top qualifiers from the round of 20 – Milne and De Livera. In the first set, Milne built a useful lead of 20imps. These four boards were among the more interesting

Liam Milne chose to open the North hand 1♦ and Michael Whibley responded 1♠. Liam tried 2♣ and Michael gave preference to 2♦.

Arjuna De Livera led his singleton trump which Ian Robinson ducked to Liam's Jack. The ♠J was led, covered by dummy's King and taken by Ian with the Ace. He cashed the ♥K and then the ♣A before continuing a heart which Liam ruffed in hand. Liam continued with a trump towards dummy's Queen and Arjuna discarded the ♥4 – which was to have serious effects downstream. Ian took the ♦Q with his Ace and played another heart for Liam to ruff, dropping Arjuna's Ace. The two top diamonds were now cashed to bring about

Liam cashed the two high clubs and used Arjuna's ♣J as a stepping stone to the ♠Q.

Had Arjuna pitched a when he discarded the ♥4, then the contract would have gone down and 4 imps would have been saved.

Then on the next, it was Ian's turn for an endplay:

Ian played in 4♠ after Liam and Michael had competed vigorously in clubs.

The ♣4 was led, ruffed by declarer. A small spade picked up North's Jack and was taken by the Ace on table. The top hearts were unblocked and a club was ruffed in hand. After Ian had cashed the ♥Q, the position was:

Ian played the ♥J and South could be endplayed by ruffing or be endplayed by being thrown-in on the next trick. Either way, he was going to either concede a ruff/sluff or find the ♦K for declarer.

Board 10 showed the luck that can sometimes arise from bidding methods.

Liam was quickly in 3NT with little information about the North-South hands available to the defence


A diamond was led, taken by dummy's King and the ♣J was allowed to stand. A second club was taken by East with the Ace and he had his last chance to beat the contract. With nothing to go on he continued diamonds and that was that.

In the other room, artificial methods saw South declare and it was routine to switch to spades as quickly as possible. Two clubs and three spades meant one off.

Then board 12 and a pair of cancelling errors on the one trick

East played in 4♥ and received the lead of the ♠3. Declarer took this on table and ruffed a spade. Two top hearts were cashed and then a diamond was led towards dummy's Queen. South went in with the King and continued diamonds to the Queen and Ace. North switched to a spade which declarer ruffed. The position now was



If declarer leads the club 9 or 10 then the defence is without recourse. However, declarer chose the ♣7. If this is covered by the 8 then declarer is without recourse. Say he finesses the Queen. North takes his King and plays a diamond. Declarer is on table and can only get back to hand with a trump to lead another club. South covers and the suit is blocked.

At the table, however, South played small on the ♣7 and declarer could have been safe by playing small. North would have to take the King and dummy would be high.


East, however, finessed the ♣Q which lost to North's jack. North then compensated by returning a club which found South's Jack. Had a diamond been returned then the situation is as was described above when the ♣7 is covered by the 8.

Quite a complicated little position in which spot cards and position have a huge effect.

The second half of the match saw De Livera claw back 11 of the deficit on what was mostly an uneventful set.


Only a few hands caught the eye. This one reminded me of a dictum of ex-NZ international player David Matthews. David would frequently announce – "If a 2NT opener is about to be passed out – double it."

He was proved right (again) on board 20



After three passes, South opened 2NT. No-one moved and South quietly went one off.

Then a little bit of optimism by Nabil Edgton and Alex Smirnov got dealt to.



After a pass from South Alex opened 1♣ and the auction continued

Richard Brightling doubled with some relish and shortly thereafter wrote +500 in the book.

I wonder what Andy and Nabil would have done to Richard's 1NT.

Then on the next, Alex and Nabil bid accurately in one sense – they stopped short of a non-making slam. Unfortunately the suit of the making slam only got a brief passing mention
