

Bill opened 1♥ after a pass from North. South called 2♥ to show at least 5-5 in spades and a minor. West raised to 3♥ and Bill bid game.

The ♠10 was led and, when Bill played small from dummy, North produced the King. This looked very much like a singleton so South had six spades. When Bill continued by laying down the ♥A, it was South's turn to contribute a King – definitely a singleton this time.

Therefore, South's shape appears to be 6-1-5-1. There was only one hope.

Bill continued with a small club and South obliged with the Ace. Bill could take the continuation, cash the ♣Q and cross to the ♥Q. The ♣K and ♣J provided discards for Bill's losing diamonds. North could have his two trump tricks but that still left Bill with 10 others.



### Tim Bourke's Problem - Solution

You could put all your eggs in one basket and rely on the spade suit entirely. This would succeed automatically if they were 3-3. You would also be well placed if the spades were 4-2 and the hand with four spades had at most two trumps, since then you could not be prevented from getting a spade ruff in dummy. However, playing on spades would see you defeated on this layout:



A far better plan is to play along dummy reversal lines. After winning the first trick with dummy's eight of trumps, play the king and ace of diamonds and then ruff dummy's remaining diamond high. The next move is to play ace and another club. Suppose East wins and plays a second trump. You will win this in dummy with the ace and ruff a club. A spade to the ace allows you to ruff dummy's remaining club. So far, you will have made a spade, two trumps, two diamonds, a club and three ruffs in hand for a total of nine tricks. The nine of trumps in dummy is high and it will be your tenth trick.

### A Chapter Of Accidents

In the fourth round of the SWPT, I chose to kibitz Mikes Cornell and Prescott against Neville Francis and Kevin Steffensen. With three players with international experience at the table, there promised to be some good tight bridge.


But promises are sometimes broken.

Have a lead problem. You hold

Rho opens 1, you overcall 2NT to show the minors and lho ends the auction with a bid of 4. What do you lead.

The odds are 10-3 that you'll choose a lead to beat the contract on




At the table Mike P. Led a small spade. Kevin called for the Queen and, essentially, that was that - 10 tricks. The spade lead was not found in the other room so 11 imps went to Steffensen.

On board 4, Kevin made 4\(\phi\) which failed in the other room. Mike C effectively running up the white flag.








In the endgame, Kevin needed a trick from the diamond suit. When he led a small diamond from the South hand, Mike took his Ace and then played the King. Mike P was, I thought, a touch acidulous as he suggested that had Mike C continued with a small diamond, at least declarer would have been on a guess. The same contract went one down in the other room for another 12 imps.


Then the Mikes reached a slam that only Deepfinesse or a person with a well-positioned mirror would make.



Kevin passed and Mike P opened 1♣. Neville put in 1♦ and Mike C doubled which showed 4+ hearts. That lit Mike P's fuse and he reached for Keycard. Moments later, Mike C was declaring 6♥. The ♣Q was too hard to find so


that was one off. The opposition E-W were less adventurous and so, after only 5 boards the score was Steffensen 34 – Noble 0.

Then Neville and Kevin stole the contract:



Mike P opened 1 → as dealer and Neville interjected 2 ▼. Mike C passed and Kevin raised the ante - 3 ▼. And there it rested. Somehow, I didn't feel that the Mikes had really got together at all. 3NT is, of course, a make with the spade break and club and heart finesses. The same unlovely contract was played in both rooms for the same 3 off.

Then an auction which probably should not appear in a family publication





Two off seems perfectly fair and combined with 4 making at the other table left the score as Steffensen 40 – Noble 1.


Then Kevin went conservative.



He opened 1♥ and, after Neville responded 1♠, only advanced to 3♥. Neville had no reason to go anywhere. A diamond lead established Kevin's tenth trick immediately. In the other room, the hand was played in 3NT by South and that was not a challenge for declarer.

Onto the next and Kevin and Neville failed to heed the gypsy's warning





Mike P opened 1♠ which drew two passes before Kevin doubled in the pass-out seat. Mike came again with 2♠ which again went to North for another double. Neville offered 3♠ and Kevin tried 3♠. Neville decided that a spade stop was all that was needed for 3NT, so he asked. Kevin had one so they played 3NT which, granted Mike P's spade repetition, seems to be gambling on nine quick tricks. When the diamonds didn't break, Kevin was quickly two down. The Noble team had now collected 14 imps in just two boards and more were just around the corner, though whether these were earned is another question.

Mike C had a high level judgement call to make. How would you have done?




Mike opted for (relative) safety with a 5♥ call. The layout was



The ♣9 lead saw the Jack from North and Mike P's Ace. Trumps were drawn and three more rounds of clubs disposed of two of West's diamonds – that held the damage to one off.


Three club tricks, and the Ace of hearts, not to mention the problematic ♠K, would have seen 4♠ down, so one off in 5♥ didn't look like good insurance. However 4♠ was allowed to make in the other room and Noble had another 11 imps.

Ten imps went straight back when Neville was able to make 3NT while the same contract went down at the other table on



A spade lead and repeated spade plays by the defence saw Neville score three tricks in that suit and three in each minor.

Board 15 had no material effect on the match but it did bring up a point of law of which, I suspect, many players would not be aware.



Neville opened 1♦ and Kevin responded 2♣. Mike P interposed 2♣ - showing both majors. Neville rebid 2NT and Mike C passed.

Neville and Kevin play 2/1 game forcing in all sequences EXCEPT this one. The front page of their card shows 2/1 game forcing though there is a description of this sequence buried inside. Each time that a 2/1 sequence had come up in the first 14 boards, it had been alerted. Accordingly Mike C assumed that this was a game forcing situation and he anticipated the likelihood of defending 3NTx in the near future. So he passed. So too did Kevin. Mike P queried this and Neville explained that this was the one 2/1 situation which was not game forcing. Mike P then called 3 and Mike C blasted to the spade game – feeling that he had not shown his hand in any way. .

Before the lead, Mike C observed that he had very likely been damaged by the inadequate information about the auction. Had he known





that 2NT was non-forcing then he would have called 3♠ and very probably played there. There was no rancour and Neville and Kevin were quite happy for the director to be called if the Mikes thought it necessary. The hand was played out for one off and then the director was called.

There was no dispute about the facts and the director retired to consider. When he returned, he ruled that the score would stand. The reason being in Law 21B1

Until the end of the auction period and provided that his partner has not subsequently called, a player may change a call without other rectification for his side when the Director judges that the decision to make the call could well have been influenced by misinformation given to the player by an opponent

Had the director been called when Mike P queried the pass of 2NT then Mike C would have been given back his pass. He could then have called 3♠. As this didn't happen, no change was allowed.

Law 9B1 is also germane:

### The Director should be summoned at once when attention is drawn to an irregularity.


There was no swing on board 16 although, from where I was sitting, anything seemed likely.



The Mikes play Drury so 2♣ was an enquiry as to whether or not Mike P had a real opening bid. 2♦ said that he did and 4♦ was intended as a splinter for spades. It is left as an exercise for the reader to decide whether or not Mike P was in agreement with this interpretation when he bid 6♦. Still no harm done but no swing either as less arcane methods yielded the same result in the other room.

Noble got the biggest swing of the match on the last board.



After three passes, Neville opened 1♣. Mike C raised to 2♣ to show the majors and Kevin passed. Mike P opted for spades and Neville came again with 3♦. That propelled Kevin to 5♣ and, a little wistfully, Neville passed.




In the other room, George Bilski opened the South hand 1♦ and West raised to 2♦. East offered the choice of majors back to her partner with a 3♦ bid. George put in 4♣ and West 4♥. Barry Noble raised clubs and East raised hearts. George now bid the club slam for 13 imps.

I remember NZ international player, Scott Smith, lamenting after an NZ Teams match some years back that "Bridge was the loser."

This, I think, was another such match, at least for the Mikes...

### A Miniature Gem (Revisited)

Yesterday I reported David Stern's defensive gem on this hand.



Robert Grynberg had led the ♥10 against 3NT and David ducked. Terry Brown took his heart trick but, when David came in with the •Q and played the ♥K, Robert was able to overtake and take his heart tricks.

Barbara Travis points out that Terry has a counter available. He ducks the ♥10 as well! The suit is now blocked. If Robert plays a second heart, David has none left to return and, if Robert doesn;t play a heart then Terry has no further problems.

I'm sure there's a Rueful Rabbit hand in one of Mollo's books built around this theme – not that I'm suggesting for one second that RR occupied any seat at this particular table.

### Match 5

This saw David Stern and Robert Grynberg (South) opposing Bruce and Merle (East) Marr.

Bruce and Merle were long time leaders on the all time NZ masterpoints ladder. They have been resident in Queensland for some years now but still return to NZ for the National Congress and further deposits in their masterpoint accounts.




**Second Hand Dealing Machines** 

The first hand of interest was this one where Bruce and Merle's methods nearly caught Robert out.




Bruce and Merle play a form of modified Precision. Their 1♣ bid in first and second seat is 14+ and in third or fourth seat is 16+. Merle opened 1♣ as East and Robert overcalled 1♥ - intending it as spades or the minors (as it would be over a 16+ 1♣) but systemically natural over the little 1♣. David raised to game over Bruce's pass and this ran back to Bruce. He couldn't resist the double and Robert ran to 4♠. This was also doubled and so guessing what had happened, David corrected to 5♠.

Merle began with the ♠A and switched to the ♥A and another heart to David's Jack. David played a diamond to dummy's Ace and ruffed a spade back to hand. Over to table with the ♥K and another spade was ruffed. He now ruffed his small heart in dummy and then ruffed yet another spade in hand. This left



When David advanced the ♥K, Merle could ruff but was then forced to lead away from her club holding, so David escaped for only one off.

Board 9 saw Bruce and Merle reach the top spot, only to be bullied out of it.




Bruce opened a Precision style 2♣ after three passes. David doubled and Merle called 3NT. This is unbeatable but Robert stepped in with 4♠. This is going one down but it's hard to blame Bruce for calling 5♣. There were only 10 tricks available in that contract.






Then Merle faced problems in the bidding and Bruce on the lead.



David passed as dealer and Merle opened 1. Robert overcalled 1. and Bruce made a nonforcing 2. bid. David jumped to 3. and Merle had a problem. She chose not to support hearts and Robert bid the spade game. It seemed to be too late now to find a heart contract and take the eleven available tricks so Bruce had to lead.

An unfortunate ♣5 saw Robert play low from dummy and the ♣Q was his tenth trick.

The last board saw Merle faced with yet another tricky bidding decision.



Bruce opened 1♥ (which probably piqued David's interest) and Merle relayed with 1♠.

Bruce showed pretty much what he had with a 3♥ bid and Merle faced the decision – 3NT or 4♥. Neither contract is particularly appealing when you look at all four hands. Merle opted for hearts.

David led a club and Bruce won on table. When Robert contributed the ♥J to trick two, David smiled.

Two down was the final outcome.

The dust settled on a 22-8 victory to David and Robert's team in a match in which they seemed to get more of the crucial decisions right than did Bruce and Merle.


