AUSTRALIA AT THE OLYMPIAD

Summary: The Open Team qualified in $4^{\rm th}$ place for a Knockout Round of 16 match against Italy, which we will describe here tomorrow. They are the first Australian Team (Open or Women's) ever to qualify from the Round Robin of an Olympiad. The Women came $13^{\rm th}$ out of 20, and due to Zone 7's performance in this event, Zone 7 will have only one spot in the Venice Cup in 2001 and 2003, making the Final of the next Easter's Zone 7 Women's Championships a more vital match than it has been. The Seniors came $5^{\rm th}$ of 24 teams, close to the Bronze Medal.

Notes:

- 1. NZ Open came =5th/18 in Group 4, 12 VP behind 4^{th} , a very good performance.
- 2. NZ Women came $14^{\rm th}/20$ in Group 1 (their team included Jillian Hay). Because at least one of Australia & NZ did not finish in top half of Women's, Zone 7 now has only one instead of two spots in 2001 and 2003 Venice Cup.
- 3. To check out the performance of the Australian Open or Women in ANY MATCH from the Round Robin: go to www.bridgeolympiad.nl/results.html, click on the red Round Number for the result of the match, then click on the red number to the left of Australia's result (giving you the lineups and the scorecard of the match), then click on the red Board Number (on the left) of any hand where the imp turnover is interesting to see the Hand Record of that hand. We would have let you know this earlier had we known about it ourselves.
- 4. In an interview in Daily Bulletin #1 (page 4), WBF President Jose Damiani was asked: "The Olympics: what is the latest news?"
 - "We have a strategy ... we are working to be present in Salt Lake City, even with a single exhibition match, but our aim is really Turin 2006."
- 5. In the $1^{\rm st}$ World University Championship, Austria took the Gold Medal. Vienna

Uni had defeated an Aussie team in the Final of the Online equivalent event earlier this year but we don't know if their players were the same. Italy (with basically the same team that easily won the 1999 World Juniors where Australia came 7th) took the silver here. Although Australia did not send a team to the Maastricht event, Tan Siew Chuan from Tasmania Uni did OK (15th/22 teams) as a member of the Singapore team.

- 6. Tomorrow = Australia vs Italy (winner plays winner of Brazil vs Indonesia). While Australia is still alive in Olympiad, check this spot.
- 7. You want to know what the Italians are like? They were expected to win their Group and they did. Lauria-Versace are one of the world's very best pairs. Lauria's record goes back to Italy's halcyon days, and Versace had almost as big a reputation as Helgemo at the World Juniors in the early to mid 1990s. Bocchi-Duboin are highly regarded too. Dano de Falco also was around in the halcyon days of Belladonna and Garozzo. Dano chatted to me at some length in USA during the 1998 Cavendish Teams about the crushing defeat which my team had inflicted on him. Hopefully this is a good omen for Australia because we need all the luck we can get. Stephen Burgess has a chance for revenge as his team was eliminated in the recent Spingold by some other Italians. I don't know Dano's partner Ferraro. Italian teams have a good recent record e.g they won the 1998 Rosenblum Teams in Lille with a sponsor (Angelini) in the team.
