Sydney is supposed to dominate bridge and the trend is set to continue with good youngish players moving in. Take a look at the SA winners. Three Adelaide guys, Kieran Dyke, David Horton & Andrew Peake now call Sydney home.

In a way, the GNOT final Series is just another national teams event with playoff points. There are six of these critters - NOT, Surfers, Autumn Teams, VCC, GNOT & SNT, all doing well.

But the GNOT is special. It's by far the biggest, with over a thousand entries every year and it gives players the chance to compete in a national event at their local club, with gold points for each win. The Sydney Metropolitan final always attracts around 70 teams.

Olympic Fever

An "Olympic" event was held in Switzerland in September, with Juan Antonio present. Then on to the China Cup in October, with Damiani presiding. He says Bridge will be a demonstration sport in Salt Lake City in 2002 and a real event in Turin in 2006.

The China Cup starts with two "Intercontinental" Teams events (Open & Womens). Europe won the Open, the "All Stars" won the Women's.

The strong field included the usual suspects – Eric Kokish, Fred Gitelman, Andrew Robson, Geir Helgemo, Tony Forrester, fighting over a large prize pool. I made it US\$16,000. Naturally, Phillip Morris were sponsors. Here's a hand from one of the China Daily Bulletins:

Hand of the Day

This hand was played eight times in 4♥, with three declarers succeeding:

West or East declared 4♥ on a spade lead to the ace. Nearly all declarers cashed ♣A-K for a spade pitch then led a diamond to South's ace. On the next spade, most North's were able to overruff with the ♥6 and give partner a diamond ruff. A third spade meant one off.

Kokish ruffed the second spade with the ♥7, overruffed by the jack. The diamond return did him no harm. Better is for North to return a club, saddling declarer with a second diamond loser.

This was a pleasing hand for the China Editor because he got the analysis wrong, allowing him to run the story again next day, filling up another page with little effort.

Forrester pointed out that declarer still makes on the ♣Q return. He crosses to the ♥A to lead another diamond through South, protecting the K-Q from ruffs.

Kirsten Moller for the European Women's team simply played South, the overcaller, for the ♦A. She won the ♠A, cashed ♥K-A, then led a diamond up. She was the only declarer to lose a spade but ... ♣♦♥♠
